

Thanksgiving Sunday: November 19, 2017

Ecumenical Dialogue: Rabbi Arnie Sleutelberg & Reverend John Doud



Our worship service on Sunday, November 19th (10:30 am), will truly be one of Thanksgiving. We will be welcoming the congregation of Temple Beth Shalom, who meet in the oldest synagogue in the state of Michigan: Temple Beth El of Traverse City. Rabbi Arnie Sleutelberg will be joining with John Doud in a dynamic, exciting, captivating interfaith dialogue focusing on “Bounty and Fragility.”



Rabbi Arnie was born and raised in Hudson, Michigan. Arnie, his sister Ester, and his parents, Simon and Edith – who were holocaust survivors – were active members of Temple Beth Israel in Jackson, Michigan. This is where Arnie and John first became acquainted with each other in 1981 (the church John served in Jackson, Arbor Grove Congregational Church, and Temple Beth Israel, celebrated an annual pulpit exchange and dialogue). Arnie and John have something else in common: they are both graduates of Albion College (Arnie was graduated in 1980 and John was graduated in 1975). After Albion, Arnie received his Master’s degree and rabbinic ordination from Hebrew Union College in New York. He sought a position that would combine a love for Judaism with teaching, counseling and community development. Along came an offer as senior rabbi and spiritual leader of Congregation Shir Tikvah in Troy, Michigan, and, after 28 years of service, he retired from his position and was named as their Rabbi Emeritus.

Rabbi Paul Yedwab of Temple Israel in West Bloomfield, has this to say about Arnie: “It is rare to find such a seamless combination of both courage and compassion. People who are courageous, take strong positions, seek to change the world, to live their lives by their ideals no matter what, are often ‘hard’; they have to be. People who are empathic, by virtue of their compassion, are often seen to be ‘soft.’ But Rabbi Arnie somehow, magically, mystically, amazingly, is courageous and compassionate, soft and hard at the same time. He gives the best hugs, sings from his very kishkas, preaches from his conscience, and teaches by his example.”

As the former spiritual leader of Congregation Shir Tikvah, Rabbi Arnie led the synagogue to affiliate with both the Reform and Renewal movements in Judaism. The foundation of the Renewal movement is that it takes a look at Jewish traditional practices and renews them in a way to make them relevant and meaningful for the modern-day Jew. Speaking about his former congregation, as well as his present congregation in Traverse City, Rabbi Arnie talks about how they welcome all who seek to find a spiritual place to call home, including intermarried couples, gays and lesbians, Jews-by-choice, Jews-by-birth, families, and singles. As Arnie expresses it, “New people who come in to worship with us will feel immediately embraced, without any judgment, with no expectation that they need to be anybody other than who they are....valuing diversity is what makes for a rich life. Having exposure to a wide variety of thoughts, people, traditions, and views is part of what makes life worth living. A world that really treasures diversity would very likely not have the plagues we face today.”

One of his passions has been connecting with lost Jewish tribes around the world as well as sharing spiritual traditions with indigenous tribes. He has traveled throughout Africa and Asia, teaching and gleaning. He brought suitcases of ritual items for the Jewish Lemba tribe in South Africa and created a Shabbaton for them. He has taught in New Zealand, Costa Rica, Nepal, Thailand, India and Senegal as well. Bridge-building

between the Jewish community and other religions, ethnicities and races also has been among his passions. Helping foster understanding with Muslims, African Americans and Christians is a focus of his rabbinate.

In 2012, Rabbi Sleutelberg wed his partner, Robert Crowe, in Windsor. After a ceremony in Robert's native England with family and friends, they had a ceremony at their home in Lake Orion, where nearly 400 congregants joined them in celebrating their union.

Finally, since this is an Ecumenical Weekend, our congregation has been invited to worship with Rabbi Arnie and his congregation on Friday, November 17th at 6:30 pm. Arnie and John will share in worship together, and talk about Thanksgiving from a Jewish perspective. Plans are to carpool from our church to Temple Beth El in Traverse City (311 Park Street, Traverse City 49684.....Phone: 231-946-1913). There will be more information sent to you by e-mail. We encourage you to attend one or both of the worship services over the weekend of November 17th and 19th – this will be a highlight for us as we continue our bridge-building through hospitality, inclusion, and interfaith education.

Transgender Day of Remembrance

Monday, November 20, 2017

Today we remember and honor transgender people around the world whose lives have been lost to anti-transgender violence.

Transgender Day of Remembrance (TDOR) is an annual observance on November 20 which began in 1999. This is the day that honors the memory of those whose lives were lost in acts of anti-transgender violence. Additionally, during the week of November 14-20, individuals and organizations around the country participate in Transgender Awareness Week to help raise the visibility of transgender and gender non-conforming people and address the issues these communities face.

TDOR was started by transgender advocate Gwendolyn Ann Smith as a vigil to honor the memory of Rita Hester, a transgender woman who was killed on November 28, 1998. The vigil often involves reading a list of the names of those who died that year.

Even now, the deaths of those based on anti-transgender hatred or prejudice are largely ignored.
