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Thoughts – Sam Pentces

In many regards, social media is a double-edged sword in that it's capable of bringing people together, but is also a way to separate them into collective hiveminds. This is the reality we see today: the dawning age of Modern Tribalism.

This trend in behavior is the result of individuals feeling empowered to be bolder when voicing their opinion online. The reason for this is that social media sites provide a layer of protection and provide anonymity, as they often don't require people to show their faces or reveal themselves as people. Further, important communication cues such as tone, facial expressions, and body language aren't existent. Thus, due to the lack of cues, people are given little to no consequence for their actions online. They can lie, exaggerate, and boast themselves up as something they aren't. Plus, due to the internet's anomalous nature, it's incredibly difficult to fact check. Through this anonymity, people looking for, or stumble upon others who share their views, can sympathize with each other without knowing about each other more intimately. They begin to envision both themselves and others as just labels with little to no regard for hobbies, interests, or anything that would define one's personality. Thus, they unintentionally train themselves to view anyone who voices a different opinion through a very 2-dimensional lens. Instead, when then someone opposes their viewpoints; all they see is a threat to their hivemind, and what they believe to be best.

For example: liberals and conservatives have differing opinions on how taxes should be spent. Liberals believe that the government should care for its people with programs such as health care, education, and other social programs. Conservatives believe that taxes should be spent on national defense and keeping the country safe and advocate privatization of many social programs that liberals would like the federal government to provide. But when both sides are in their social media bubbles, they can't see or hear any validity of a point of view that's different from their own. Usually the liberal will hear "I refuse to help those less fortunate than I", and the conservative will hear "I want people to live entirely off the government", and it turns into a never-ending back and forth argument with both sides trying to 1-up each other. Rather than finding compromise, both sides attack each other on social media and accomplish nothing. They often resort to name-calling and sometimes even threats. Both often use plentiful amounts of facts and statistics, but they often come from questionable sources. And due to the possibility of "evidence" being edited, it's easy to spread misinformation and hard to disprove it. Similar behavior can be seen across dozens of social media groups with no resolution being made.

True, this is partially the fault of sites that recommend people and groups based on a person's search history and what they have posted. When you join a group, or like a post, the site will begin to send you more posts, ads, and propaganda, in an effort to re-enforce your commitment to that mindset. While it is manipulative, it is NOT mind control, and it's still the choice of the individual to join a group and engage in its behavior.

When people lose themselves to hiveminds, diversity of thought, individuality, and critical thinking are pushed to the side. In their place is the expectation that the group will think alike, adopt the same doctrine, stand against certain principles, and work in unison for that particular tribe's goals. The result is the sacrifice of the benefits that come from diversity. People sacrifice the strengths that results from having their beliefs and views challenged. Instead of seeing different viewpoints as opportunities to learn and grow, people see them as outsiders who threaten everything they hold dear, and they become fearful and defensive. They are determined to maintain the tribe's identity.

Too many people who participate in social media act rash and spout ignorance as a badge. It's often difficult to fathom any voice of reason that could bring them to their sense and not get lost in the noise. While bias and ignorance will never truly go away, there is



some way to combat tribalism. You see, these groups often argue that their side has been in the dark for too long, and now it's the world's turn to shut up and listen. The solution is to never shut up, but always list. Just don't listen unquestioningly like they expect you to. Listen with acknowledgement, doubt, and question, and then ask them politely to do the same. You shouldn't be forced to accept ideas you don't agree with, but you should respect the right of existence of ideas that are different from your own. Be willing to form sophisticated debates with someone, insist on not engaging in the back and forth spouting of buzzwords. Share your opinions politely, don't force them onto others. Soften tension with humor if the need arises. But above all else, don't allow yourself to be funneled through social media and give a label for yourself. Be more than a label; be an individual, be unique, be yourself, and encourage others to do the same.

As previously reported, the Board of Trustees is scheduling a law enforcement presentation entitled, "Safety and Security of the Church." Until that time the Board has decided that all doors will be locked within 10 minutes of the service beginning. This policy will apply to all groups using the church. The Board is in the process of researching safety concerns in today's environment. Please be patient while remembering that this policy is for all our safety. We will create a safety and security plan together after the presentation.

There will be a congregational vote August 12 regarding the policy of doors being locked during service and whenever the church is being used (see proxy form in this issue if you cannot be at the August 12 service to vote).

Report from Nancy Liebau – UCC WOMEN’S CONFERENCE

A few months ago, by chance or by God's HAND, I read about the UCC Women's Conference to be held in June: *The Gathering*.

Women's gatherings are not new to me. I have gathered yearly with women at the Adrian Dominican Motherhouse for 34 reflective retreat weekends where faith, fellowship and fun are in abundance! *The Gathering* promised educational presentations as well as arts and crafts and Bible Study. Also included: discussions, prayer, song, food, entertainment, and time alone with nature and our Creator!

What did I have to lose? Besides, Donna, Charlotte and Linda were going to be there! I signed up, arrived Friday afternoon for the Newcomers Meeting and "eased right in to this" gathering of Christian Women!

Among the highlights of the weekend were three presentations I chose to attend. The first: "If You Are White, You Are Privileged". The presenter had sent two articles to participants prior to the session in preparation for discussion. P. McIntosh calls white privilege "an elusive and fugitive subject" and Susan Grant, the hostess for the group, had no trouble leading a lively discussion.

Throughout the next hour stories were shared, eyes may have been opened, and most importantly, awareness awakened and perhaps some personal determination to continue the search. Donna shared a book with me, "Waking Up White" which I am reading at present.

Denise enjoys "working" with clay seeing it as a way to be close to the earth, sometimes messy, and close to our Creator, who is always shaping and reshaping us. She led us in prayer and meditation at the close of her presentation: "God shapes me, I don't shape God".

In conclusion, I am certain that the HAND of God led me to this weekend - I needed some "shaping" - I am looking forward to the next Gathering of the Women of the United Church of Christ!
