

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ROOM VERSUS SPACE

A message from the Reverend Patty Higgins Minister of the First Congregational UCC of Benzonia, Michigan





In Traci Blackmon's candidate sermon, she spoke of the balconies that were built in churches, space to accommodate more people. As time went on, it was the marginalized that were placed up in the balconies, placing those on the edges, primarily the people of color and the poor. As she continued, Traci made a connection between the words space and room. The churches had made space, but had they made room? Had they made room for the people that would fill up that space?

This question struck me then and has followed me these three weeks since Synod. I went to Synod as a visitor with the Maine Delegation, as a Member in Discernment. I was encouraged to be part of all delegation caucuses and discussions. I enjoyed meals with the delegation. The differences were that I had a white name badge denoting me as a visitor, not a blue one for a delegate. I was not part of any committee discussing resolutions; I did not vote. I was at every plenary in the gallery watching the proceedings. I was in the balcony.

After a day or so of plenaries, I heard one of my fellow Maine travelers saying that some chocolate would be good on the delegation table as debates and amendments were at hand. During a break, I bought some chocolate. As the plenary was being called back to order, I headed for the Maine delegation table. I was met at the railing that separates the delegates from the gallery by a volunteer checking name badges. As mine was white and not blue, I was not allowed on the floor. Shocked, I said that I was merely placing chocolate on the table for my friends. "Sorry, can't let you through" was the reply. Thankfully, Rich was beside me and he carried on with said chocolate in hand.

Long story short, this incident, combined with Rev. Blackmon's comments, hit me right between the eyes. How does all of this play out in our churches? Do we provide space but no room? Do we invite people in and then not include them? How freely do we share information? Who is allowed where within our lives, mission work, and call to do the work we are called to do?

Room versus Space.

May there always be more room and not enough space.

On July 15, 2006, he was ordained as a priest in the White Plum lineage by his teacher Susan Myoyu Andersen, Roshi, and in the summer of 2008 was Shusso (head priest) of the Great Plains Zen Center at Myoshinji–Subtle Mind Temple. In June 2012, he received Dharma Transmission (Shiho) from Myoyu Roshi and is now the resident teacher at Great Wave Zen Sangha in northern Michigan.

Gendo Sensei is also a writer with numerous publications of poetry in a variety of magazines and in the anthology <u>Beneath a Single Moon: The Legacy of Buddhism in American Poetry</u>. He is the author of the book, <u>The Driftwood Shrine</u>, a collection of Dharma talks based on the work of several Buddhist-influenced American poets. He currently works as a Professor of Humanities at West Shore Community College in Ludington, Michigan, is married, and is a father of three.

Where: First Congregational Church Fellowship Hall - 200 E. Harris St (Across from the Cadillac Post Office)


Cost: Donation.

- 1. A discussion about ways to increase diversity and inclusion. The board commented that the Open and Affirming (ONA) designation that the church received a few years ago, has been a terrific way to highlight First Congregational UCC Cadillac's, "you are welcome here." The board discussed ways to increase visibility of our commitment to diversity and inclusion.
