# PASTOR'S CORNER

## “You Are the One Who You Have Been Waiting For”

My mother and father were always active in Wisconsin art and therefore viewed the world and those who inhabit it as anything that cannot be quantified. Beside regular attendance at the Milwaukee Art Center, culture was infused into the characters of the three Doud children through season tickets to the Milwaukee symphony, which we were forced to attend monthly during the 1960s. Today, this music sings my soul into being; but back then, my desire was to be any place other than the concert hall. My friends were at the Riverside Theater enjoying a Cinerama presentation of “Ben Hur” and I was listening to Beethoven and Mozart.



The only month of symphony music I enjoyed was in December since one could regularly expect the grand choral piece of Handel, “Messiah”. This was something I understood because I had heard the Hebrew word “Messiah” in church, and it had something to do with Jewish people waiting for some sort of mystical human form of God who would save the people. At the time, I was not sure what the people were being saved from or to, but rumor had it they were being saved for all time to come. In the covenant class at the Congregational church I attended, my teacher informed us the Hebrew word “Messiah” and the Koine Greek word “Christ” were synonymous (translated from *mashiah* meaning “the anointed”), and that for many Jews who lived in the early part of the first century in Palestine, the waiting was over. These “Christians” had found a savior in a man named Jesus, who was from Nazareth in Galilee, and whose birth and life and death and resurrection proved that he was indeed this longed-for Messiah or Christ or God-man who would save the people. That is why Christians celebrate his birthday every Christmas and sing “Silent Night” on the eve of his birth and “Joy to the World” on the morning of his birth. Christians honor his death and resurrection singing hymns like “In the Cross of Christ I Glory” on the Friday of his death, and “Christ the Lord Is Risen Today” on the morning of his resurrection. In the meantime, while they wait for their own deaths (after which they will be resurrected with Jesus) Christians do righteous deeds to honor the life of their Messiah, their Christ: Jesus of Nazareth.

Just prior to the Holocaust in the late 1930s, the Jewish scholar, Max Kadushin, coined an odd term to describe the Rabbis of the Talmud and Midrash. He called them “Normal Mystics.” Kadushin explained that we all have potential in becoming normal mystics, “whose lives radiate goodness, decency, learning, and who recognize blessing in every manner of things: a beautiful sight in nature, a teacher, kindness from a stranger, a child’s smile, a meal shared with loved ones.”

Rabbi Harold Kushner, the author of When Bad Things Happen to Good People, has written about his struggles while waiting for the coming of the Messiah and what the whole thing means. He uses a term to describe every human being who strives for holiness and goodness. He calls them “little messiahs.” For those of us who honestly struggle with Messiah and Christ jargon, for those of us who cannot possibly believe that Jesus was God, but that he was born a human being and died a human being just like all of us must do eventually, I suggest that we are the ones we have been waiting for. In other words, you and I are God’s normal mystics and little messiahs, encouraged to live in the example of Jesus, challenged to live in the example of others whose lives, throughout all of history, have reflected the divine nature of love and forgiveness in this world we share, and in this world that shares us.

With these thoughts in mind, I wish you a Merry Christmas, a Holy Hanukkah, an adorable Ashura, a captivating Kwanzaa, an exhilarating Eid, and for those who have no religious faith at all: happy holidays.
