Thoughts – Bill Morris (Onekama UCC)

Music is a big part of church and worship. Not that that's unusual, but we simply want to celebrate with you, and for us that takes music seriously. We want to put our best foot forward and we are proud of our music.



About thirty years ago, Robert Fulghum wrote, <u>All I really Need to Know I learned in</u> <u>Kindergarten</u>. He took simple and common experiences from early life, and with great story telling skills, insightful humor, and a comfortable folksy philosophy, simplified human values to some very basic lessons.

It dawned on me that I could use his idea of value-learning as seen through the prism of church music, and especially through my group music experiences. I offer this notion: "All I Really Need to Know About Church Life, I Learned in Choir!"

So, let me share with you a few insights from my fairly ordinary experiences. The first thing I learned was that CHOIR is different than singing a solo. Solos are good in themselves, but if you're looking for a comparison for church life, the choir seems more appropriate to me. I have sung many solos – as a kid and more recently. I can carry a tune, I can generally sing okay, but I think I have what would be called a "choir voice." My voice is better suited to be support than it is to be alone – better for blending than going solo.

In all my years I've witnessed too many people (lay and ordained) that tend to only do solo work. Some leaders I've known mistake solo work as leadership. And in the choir of church life, I've heard many folks sing their part so loud, that they attempt to make their one-part a solo – if it was meant to be or not!

How is being in the choir different than solo work? In solo work, the accompanist tries to follow you; in choral work, you must listen to each other – match your volume to theirs, and make sure you are hitting the same or a harmonious note. And a choir member should watch the director – in choirs, the director is in charge; NOT the individual.

Choir taught me to blend in and to be considerate to what other parts are singing, and submit to my Director. Choir also reminds us that we are to have active roles in the life of the church. We are followers, not spectators; we are servants, not the waited upon.

Good choir members owe it to the others to be ready, at their best, and to be prepared. Choirs also don't just sing together; they help each other grow and become more. A good choir cultivates positive development and inspires maturity. Now, due to choir, I've learned to always take my music home and practice for every coming performance because I need to be a responsible member and that means being ready and primed.

There was a man who was going to sing his first solo in church, but seemed to have gotten out on the wrong side of the musical bed. He stood up in front of the church and heard his pianist's introduction and tried to begin his solo opening, but didn't hit the right note, and for the life of him couldn't find it. He struggled with getting the words at the right time. He sounded more like a sick calf mewling in distress than a tenor singing in praise. He was getting frustrated and embarrassed and lost his volume...and his place in the song.

Suddenly a tenor in the choir began to sing with him, not too loud but trying to coax the poor man toward the right notes. The man started to find some of the notes. By the second verse, more of the choir began to sing along and the man began to remember the tune and was finding a little confidence. By the third verse the choir and the poor guy were singing with full volume. On the fourth verse, the choir stopped singing and the man

sung the best solo of his life – strong, in tune, and beautiful. The choir teaches the church to support and encourage other individuals so they may sing their parts to the best of their ability.

One last lesson we can learn from choir: are you in, or have been in a church choir? What does it feel like, especially if you are of a humble-sized church, what does it feel like when you hear: "Hey, I hear Sam Smith or Mary Jones is going to join the choir"? Few things have such an emotional response of surprise, excitement, hope, gratitude, and optimism...as a new member!

It reminds me a bit like being informed that someone wants to be baptized or someone is going to make a profession of faith and join us! Joining the choir, the church, the association is an amazing gift to all involved; it always acts as a tremendous, encouraging, and inspiring witness as our faith is reaffirmed by those who join in and join us in God's mission. And THAT is worthy of celebration and great joy! It's a time to "Sing and make music from our hearts to God!" I learned this in choir!!

BOARD OF TRUSTEES Minutes from November 19, 2018

The meeting was called to order by Chair, Laura Pentces-Jacobson. Rev. Doud shared a reflection and review of church business from the previous month.

- "Movies for the Mind" is doing well and has raised almost \$1,000 this year. Thank you to Dave and Sandy Gaunt for providing these programs.
- Previous month's minutes were read and approved.
- The financial report was read and accepted. The church houses the Jazzercise program and their monetary contribution each year is a great help to the overall budget.
- Committee Reports:
 - Building and Maintenance the glass blocks that were damaged cannot be replaced partially. Therefore, new windows similar to those on the west side of the basement will be the replacements. Estimates are being obtained. A new contract for Temperature Control has been put into place; this will amount to significant savings to the church for heating expenses.
 - Stewardship 28 pledges have been turned in as of mid-November.
 - Missions Boxes for Project Christmas are in the church for accepting donations. These will be picked up in December.
 - Safety The Safety Committee will meet to discuss guidelines for church/congregation safety and usher/greeter/sexton duties.
- Security for the offices during business hours and the workability of the church phone system was discussed. More discussion to follow; quotes and equipment are being explored.
- Insurance for the church building, liability and workmen's comp policies are being explored. Quotes from several companies have been obtained. A new company will be secured which will be a savings to the church while maintaining proper coverages.
- The role of the PRC committee, Pastoral Review process and scheduling Pulpit Stand-ins during Rev. Doud's off Sundays was reviewed. More conversation to follow next month.

Minutes from December 17, 2018

The meeting was called to order by Chair Laura Pentces-Jacobson. Rev. Doud shared review of church business from the prior month.

- Minutes from the previous meeting were reviewed and accepted.
- The financial report was read and accepted.
- Committee Reports:
 - Communications advertising for the January and February "Movies for the Mind" has been sent to the Cadillac News. It was recommended to contact the newspaper to see what it would cost for a weekly ad with the other churches.
 - Stewardship a revised pledge card was reviewed. Comments had been received to changed some of the designated giving categories; wording was changed to "Building Improvement".
- Discussion about possible sources for 6 ministerial guest speakers during the year. Contacts will be made.
