# A LETTER FROM REV. DR CAMPBELL LOVETT, UCC MICHIGAN CONFERENCE MINISTER



Eastward Ho!

I travelled with a UCC delegation to the Middle East in 2016. After visits with our mission partners in Egypt, Lebanon and Jordan we arrived in Israel/Palestine and toured Jerusalem's Old City. At the Temple Mount, we learned more about the Golden Gate. This gate, now sealed, was the only eastern entrance to the Temple Mount and is likely the gate through which Jesus entered Jerusalem on Palm Sunday. When you look at this eastern gate from outside the wall, as you walk down the hill toward the Garden of Gethsemane, you realize how steep the climb was for Jesus and his followers. Riding on a donkey would have been a great help for Jesus!

John Domenic Crossan suggests that Jesus' choice of an eastern entrance into Jerusalem was to parody the entrance from the west of Pilate and his Roman guard. Early Christians believed that in the Second Coming of Jesus, Christ would appear from the east in keeping with the Palm Sunday entrance strategy. The resurrection also was associated with the easterly direction because of the women journeying to the tomb at dawn and seeing its emptiness by morning's first sunlight. Our Easter sunrise services usually face eastward to recall that first Easter morn; and for that same reason many early churches were built with altar areas situated in the east of the building.

There is much significance in this eastward direction. I have walked through airports and seen faithful Muslims find a secluded corner, face east, kneel and offer one of their five daily prayers. I have been a part of Native American blessings where, facing east, we honored the dawn, light, wisdom and understanding. Though I admire a glorious sunset, I am more inspired by the first light of day. I've been to Cadillac Mountain in Maine where (allegedly) the sun can first be seen in the US, and to Newfoundland where the sun's rays first shine in North America. My "first light" prayer on most mornings is: "Thank you, God, for giving me another day; I've never had this one before!"

As we move past the events of Palm Sunday, Holy Week, and Easter, and now into spring and summer, I pray that the light from the east will illuminate and inspire our gatherings so that the message of life over death, hope over fear, and love over hate may be boldly proclaimed and faithfully lived out.

# **MAY'S MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES**

The Board of Trustees met on May 21 for their regular monthly meeting. Here are the highlights of the meeting.

Upcoming maintenance expenses and budget concerns. Richard Harvey noted that there are several upcoming maintenance expenses - including a scheduled furnace check, new exit signs (as required by the Fire Marshal), and the replacement of the basement windows that were vandalized last fall. The cost of these three items will be in excess of \$1000. Expenses such as these are covered by the budget, however, the budget is tight. Patrick Delaney expressed his concern (echoed by those on the board) about future unexpected expenses, such as those that might be incurred due to a major failure - such as the furnace, etc. The board recognizes that there are a number of updates and repairs that are needed in the near future and the cost of these will exceed the current budget. In light of this, the board is actively discussing and exploring methods and means to increase the funds available. The board is currently in the discussion and exploration phase and looks to present some of these ideas at the semi annual meeting, to the congregation for their input.

Determination of 501(c)3 status (IRS non-profit status). Penny Phelps relayed that she contacted the IRS in regards to the status of our 501(c)3 application and was told that they are still processing August 2018 applications (ours was submitted in October). The delay is due to the government shutdown. They suggested that she complete a request asking for an expedited process and she is doing so.

Sexton Orientation/Training. The next session for those sextons that missed Richard's orientation will be June 9 during Fellowship Hour.
