**PASTOR REYNOLDS' RAP**

The gifts he gave were that some would be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, some pastors and teachers, to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ, until all of us come to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to maturity, to the measure of the full stature of Christ...But speaking the truth in love, we must grow up in every way into him who is the head, into Christ, from whom the whole body, joined and knit together by every ligament with which it is equipped, as each part is working properly, promotes the body's growth in building itself up in love. (Ephesians 4:11-13, 15-16, NRSV)

No doubt you've heard the popular saying, "It takes a village to raise a child." Well, a similar statement could be made about churches. Say, "It takes a congregation to nurture and grow a church and its ministries?" We tend to think that most things church are the pastor's job, but the reality is that we are all ministers of the church, and it is the specific call of the pastor to "equip the saints for the work of ministry" (Ephesians 4:11). Not only this, but so many and varied are the gifts required for ministry that no one person could possibly possess them all. That's why we are the body of Christ, comprised of many different parts. We're each needed to play our unique role in that body's overall functioning.

With the busy lives so many of us lead today, not to mention the budget deficits our church encounters annually, properly equipping saints and fully exercising our gifts for ministry are increasingly difficult objectives for us to accomplish, but not impossible. At the board of trustees' retreat this past Saturday, board members and I discussed an assigned book, *The Church Mouse: Leadership Lessons from the Magic Kingdom* by Rev. Christopher W. Perry. The book covers a range of aspects of church life, from hospitality to dreaming and visioning to volunteer training to attending to the fine details and more; all for the purpose of attracting and welcoming new people, nurturing and assimilating them into the community, then seeing their lives transformed by God, training them in Christian discipleship, and launching them into positions of leadership in the church. Ideally this will be an ongoing cycle as leaders are shaped and eventually go on to mentor the next generation of leaders.

The ideas presented in this book energized and excited us as a group, but I think it's fair to say that they also overwhelmed us. You know how it goes: We get enthusiastic, but then we start talking about how small our congregation is. We start talking about how old we are. We start talking about how limited our budget is. And suddenly the moment is gone. Hope has left the building. And yet this need not be so. Many of the book's proposals required little to no money, and each of the ministry teams it discussed need not consist of more than a couple of people. Beyond this, when we're talking about ministry teams as opposed to committees, we're talking about people doing things we feel called to and are passionate about, things that, if anything, generate more energy within us, which in turn energizes those around us...so all of a sudden everything looks different, maybe even within reach. God has a tendency to work that way.

We would like to share this book and its innovative ideas with you and to involve more and more members and friends in the emerging vision and revitalization of our church and its ministries. If you're ready to take a leap of faith with us, please see me or one of our board members (**Donna, Penny, Sue, Tom, Sperr, Carol, Bob**). If we don't hear from you, don't be surprised if we tap you on the shoulder one day soon! We hope you'll journey with us into an exciting future for this progressive beacon-on-a-hill of a church.

The pastor, Board Members, and teachers are required by law to report suspected abuse or neglect of our children or adults to the Department of Human Services. As of the end of July, the facts are pretty grim. Listed below are the current figures:

**Current Deficit - \$11,745**

You can see that contributions to the General Fund exceeded projected expenses only one month so far this year. Not even the extra injection of the Art Festival Food Booth boosted our July income up to the necessary level.

So the question is, what can we do to meet our expenses? Even though \$85,958 seems like a large amount to maintain a small church, it isn't. We have many fixed expenses, such as insurance and utilities and salaries (modest as those are). We've been fortunate so far this year not to experience any extraordinary expenses; the board is doing everything it can to hold the reins.

We are interested in any suggestions you may have about ways to bring in extra funds. The bottom line, however, is that we must all do what we can to support our church. If you are behind on your pledge, please make every effort to catch up. If you do not pledge, please prayerfully consider what you can do to increase your support of the church.

Our semi-annual meeting is just a few weeks away – let's see what creative ideas we can generate by then.

### New Class!--"What the Bible Really Says about Gay Christians (May Surprise You)"

Beginning **October 2** we will have the honor of hosting this **7-week** class, which will be open to the community and taught by **Rev. Bill Lyons**, the pastor of **St. John's United Church of Christ in Grand Rapids**. Sessions will run from 5:30- 7:00 pm and include dinner for a suggested donation of **\$5.00**. Penny will be recruiting kitchen helpers in the near future.

Here's a little background information borrowed from a recent Between the Lines article:

A Grand Rapids pastor is changing the way people are reading the Bible with a 7-week Bible study for the entire community. Over 20 people of various ages, races, and faiths came to the first workshop to talk about what the Bible means in today's society. It's not about what the Bible says so much as understanding that no one has exclusive insight into what it says. "When we read the Bible we are interpreting it," says Reverend Bill Lyons. "No person simply reads the Bible. Even if you know Hebrew and Greek and are reading the original text, you're still interpreting it. The Bible was written in a specific time and place. And it was written by people who each had their own contexts and filters."

Long story short, there is some interpretive wiggle. Even as an expert with 26 years in ministry, a BA in Bible, two masters degrees, and an American Bible Society Award for

Biblical scholarship, Lyons contends that he is not here to tell others what to think, only to open peoples' minds to look at the Bible for guidance and inspiration, not absolutes.

The first class covers how to read the Bible, as well as the many ways the Bible has been interpreted and used. Subsequent classes focus on relationships and sexuality in general and on the parts of the Bible most often used as "evidence" that God is against gays.

"Some people call them 'Clobber Passages,' but I don't use that term," says Rev. Lyons.

"Properly understood, they aren't clobber passages; that's just how they're used.

Understood in their context, these 7 passages are trying to teach us God's values and boundaries for healthy sexual relationships - gay and straight. The Bible says nothing about gay Christians. Today's understanding of what it means to be gay, lesbian, bisexual, or transgender was outside of the worldview of the contributors to the body of literature we know as the Bible. Christians today try to apply what the Bible says to same gender relationships, often failing to understand the people who produced the Biblical corpus in their context."

Another term Lyons avoids when talking about the Bible is "gay marriage." "The Bible speaks of our relationships regardless of who are relationships are with. The Bible does 2 things: it prescribes things, and it describes things. Descriptions are formed with ancient worldviews, and they describe situations that were observed at the time the text was written. Prescriptions are laws from God, like the commandments. Nowhere in the Bible does it prescribe or command marriage or that marriage can only be between one man and one woman," he said. "When we talk about relationships, we talk about all relationships. When we talk about marriage, we talk about all marriage. The Bible says the same things to gay Christians that the Bible says to all Christians, for being a Christian is possible by grace through faith, sexual orientation and gender identity notwithstanding."

Rev. Lyons is a gay man who has been in a committed relationship for 11 years. He has adult children with his former wife, whom he still considers a good friend, and is very close to his children. He was ordained in the Independent Christian Churches and Churches of Christ in 1985, but in 2000 "grew beyond" his calling there and found the United Church of Christ, a denomination more in line with his progressive values. "I did everything that the fundamentalist evangelical teaching told me to do regarding my awareness of my sexual orientation. All the prayers I said asking to change my orientation, God said no to."

## MISSIONS

### **Our Mission Targets for September: Feeding America (Food Bank)**

Although the economy has stabilized a bit, foreclosures and unemployment continue to plague our area. According to the Michigan League for Human Services (<http://www.milhs.org/reminder-we-have-a-long-way-to-go>),

- The Michigan poverty rate has grown almost 25% over the past decade,
- Michigan has the 16th highest poverty rate in the nation, and
- 1 in 6 Michiganders lives in poverty, including 1 in 4 children.

One service that is keenly aware of these statistics and the challenges they pose is Feeding America, our regional food bank, which oversees the needs of agencies in 10 counties. The Rotary Club has become an essential go-between, helping families get the food they need from the food bank. On the 1st and 3rd Thursday of each month, a truck brings 10,000 lbs of food to town and parks behind Goodwill. In exchange for minimal information (name, address, phone number and reason for need) volunteers help 200 families select 50 lbs of food each.

Our gifts can go a long way in helping Feeding America help others.

### **Cadillac Area CROP Hunger Walk**

This year's Walk, 27th Annual Hunger walk for this area, will be held on **September 23**. Walkers will depart from Rotary Park at **2:00 pm** and walk from 2 to 7 miles.
